




Math

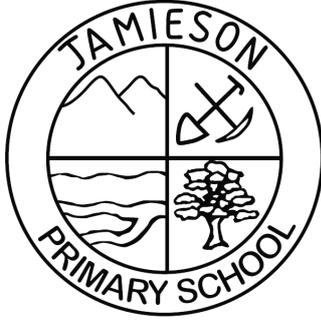
Gorilla for sale

Next week we will have a new group come and visit us. (They have already come though)





FREE SKI LESSONS OPPORTUNITY FOR PARENT HELPERS

A message from Craig Jones, the Ski coordinator of Mt Stirling:

I realise that the Ski Program is a big commitment and that schools look to the parent community for helper support. While many parents would like to assist, they might be nervous about their skiing ability, especially on those weird skinny cross country skis.

Teaching children and teaching adults to ski requires two quite different approaches from the perspective of our instructors, so I would like to offer those parents who would be interested in assisting as helpers on your ski program a free instruction clinic with our ski school on **Sunday 17th July**. This is the Sunday of the first weekend in Term 3.

Our aim would be to introduce parents and new staff to our ski school staff, the ski hire facility and the winter environment on Mt Stirling. The program will be **FREE for all participants including Ski Hire and Ski Instruction**. I would envisage parents arriving by 9.30am for ski hire and an introduction to the mountain followed by a formal ski lesson broken down between absolute first timers, beginner cross country but with downhill skills and intermediate abilities (parents can choose and then we can work out groupings as the day progresses). We will break for lunch (BYO please or you may purchase in the cafe). The afternoon will commence with an outline of our primary school program for 2021 followed by a mountain familiarisation ski tour.

My only condition is: this is a **parent helper or new staff program only, NO children please**. The ski school would be happy to run a separate children's program concurrently with the parent introductory course for the same price as the normal school session for \$55 (ski hire & lesson) if there is a demand.
